 Form distribution strategy: 7,000 distribution points were set up.










### 2. Voter ID Verification


- Creation of Overseas Voter Registry according to two criteria:

# 5. Vote counting and tally

- On election day, 170 vote
   counting and tally stations were
   set up in Tec de Monterrey
   university in Mexico City.
- Vote counting began as soon as the polls closed.
- Three days later, absentee voting results are added to those obtained in the 300 electoral districts.
